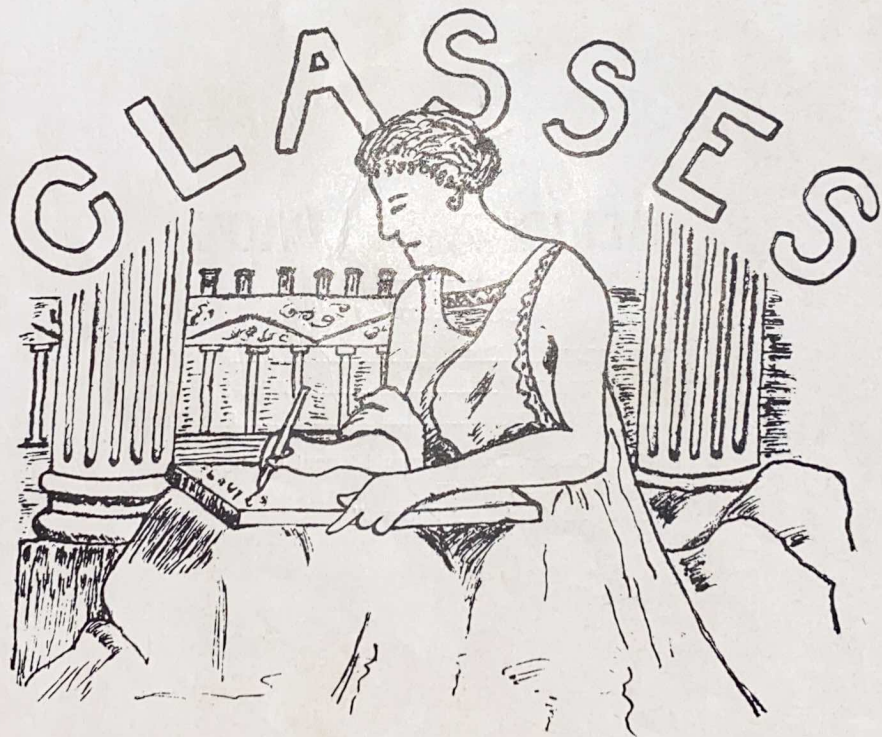

SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

Less than half of these graduated from the eighth grade in 1920, although enough new members had been added to bring the number to thirty-five. That year we chose the class colors, which we still have—lavender and gold, and our flower, the pansy.

In September, 1920, about thirty-eight freshies entered High School to be laughed at and made fun of in general. Since then our number has rapidly diminished in spite of several additions. Three of these thirty-eight have entered into the holy bonds of matrimony, one has entered his eternal home, and many have moved into other localities, leaving only eight of the original forty of 1912, but twenty-five as a whole. This is the largest class ever to graduate from old W. S. H. S.

As freshmen we took our share of hazing as all good freshies should and looked forward to the next year when we would be just a little "higher up" and would take a part in the cus-

tomary "kidding of the freshies." At the close of our freshmen year we gave the Sophs a merry chase in a pennant fight. We also found this a renewed pleasure at the close of the Soph year.

We have always been represented in all branches of school activities, including music, literary, typing and athletic events. In athletics especially we have been well represented both in numbers and records, placing three in boys and three in girls basket-ball and four in track.

Strange is the feeling of each Senior as the time draws near to start out in the world and prove what these twelve years of work have meant to us. As freshmen we envied the Senior but as Seniors we look back with longing on the old jolly High School days which will be over so soon for us.

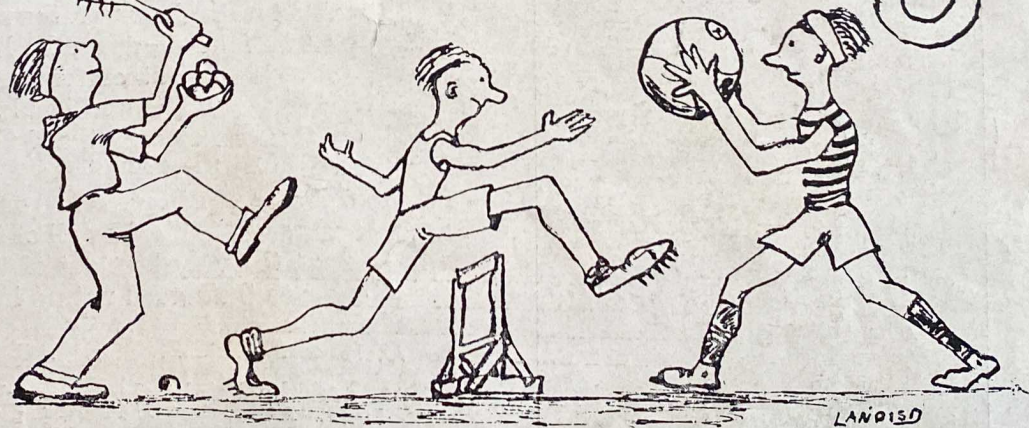

Coach Pannell is to be given much credit for the athletics in the W. S. H. S. He came here three years ago, and began work on a small group of about eight men for a winning basket ball and track team. He succeeded in putting Willow Springs "on the map" the first year. The following year he had more material to work on and therefore turned out some good teams. Mr. Pannell is known all over the S. C. A. as a coach that knows how to get the very best out of his men, and one that puts his whole heart and soul in the work. Mr. Pannell is liked by all of the boys, as he can get the very best out of the boys, by appealing to their good nature instead of "bawling them out."

Since athletics in Willow Springs have at last reached the height that they should, it is no more than right that Coach Pannell should have much credit for this.

BASKET BALL REVIEW

BOYS

The 1922-23 basket ball season was brought to a glorious finish with a silver loving cup won at the Drury tournament, tucked safely away.

The 1923-24 season opened late on account of the new High School building not being completed. But, nevertheless, between rains and zero weather, the boys and girls would have a short practice.

The season opened with W. Fair captain, and L. Masnor, forwards, A. Benton, center, J. Benton and T. Coker, guards, all last year men. Protiva, Wilkinson, Hubbs and Ferguson, subs.

Although a few games were lost to mediocre teams, it was due to our late start and not superiority, as most all of these teams were beaten later in the season by old W. S. H. S.

W. Fair, captain, at left forward, is a valuable man who is always "in the game" and is counted on for the majority of points. Wade made the second All Star team for the S. C. A.

L. Masnor, right forward, was by far the fastest man on the team. His fast floor work brought the crowds to their feet many times. It will be hard to fill his place next year.

A. Benton, center, is credited for getting the "tap off" on every center in the Association. At back guard he can't be beaten for keeping our opponents score down. He will be missed very much next year.

J. Benton, right guard, is always in the thick of the game, is a hard fighter, and can almost always be counted on for some points.

T. Coker, left guard, is a fast, shifty player, who can take the ball from anyone and get it under our basket for two points.

H. Protiva, sub forward; O. Hubbs, sub guard; Ferguson, sub center, and Wilkinson, sub forward, all play a good game and will make a wonderful combination next year.

GIRLS

The girls of W. S. H. S. were handicapped this year as their practice was somewhat limited. They started very late in the season and were therefore not in very good shape when the first games were played. Much could be said of their fighting spirit as this, sometimes, put more fight in the girls to help them to win.

The girls lineup for 1923-24 was: P. Lovan, A. Smith, E. Richman, E. Cunningham, M. Schureman and H. Murrell. E. Wilson, L. Smith and R. Protiva played in almost all of the games.

P. Lovan, forward, is a fast player and was very useful as a "basket shooter" this season.

A. Smith, forward, is a good player for every position and was used in every game.

E. Cunningham, right center, is a very sensational player and is by far the fastest player on the team. She was awarded an honorable mention in the S. C. A.

E. Richman, jump center, can "get the tap" on any center in the S. C. A. Epha is a hard fighter and can be given much credit for her good work in center.

H. Murrell, guard, although kept out of part of the games, because of sickness, seldom ever let a forward get by her for a basket.

M. Schureman guard, is without doubt the best guard in the S. C. A. With her air-tight guarding and fast floor work, she was unanimously given the all star position for guard.

E. Wilson, L. Smith and R. Protiva are first year players, and are expected to help make an excellent team for next year.

REVIEW FOR 1924

The results of this year's track team was excellent. The season opened with Masnor, Fite, A. Benton, Corbin, Richman, Kelly, Fair and Wilkerson for a team. Our first meet was a dual with West Plains. Coach Pannell got some ideas from this meet on how to line his small squad up for a winning team. The following week West Plains returned the meet, and things began looking better for Old Willow when our eight men were only defeated by a few points by West Plains' eighteen.

In the big meet of the S. C. A. Fite and Masnor showed up exceptionally well. Masnor won the gold medal for being high point man of the meet. He took 3 firsts for 15 points while Fite followed close with 12.

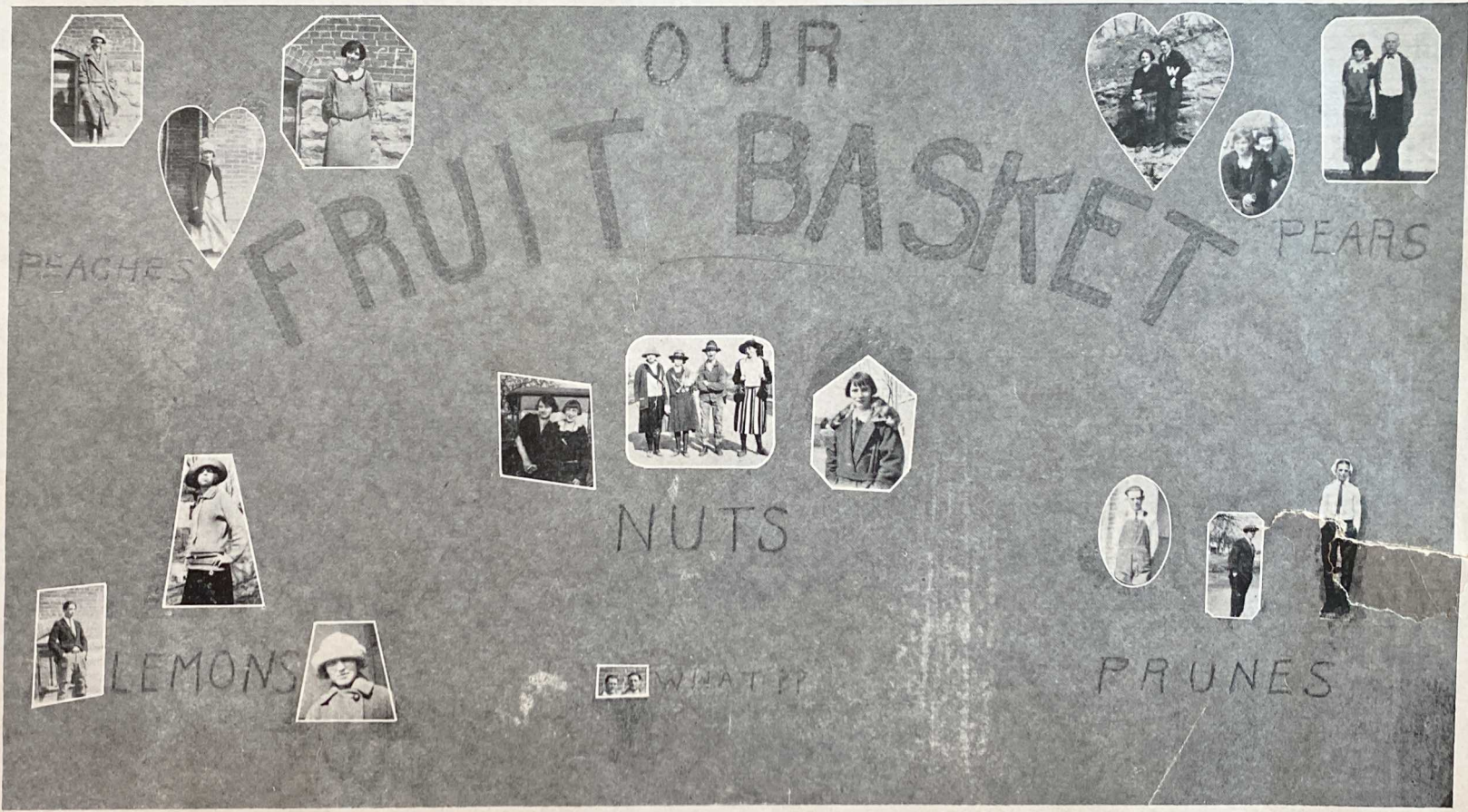

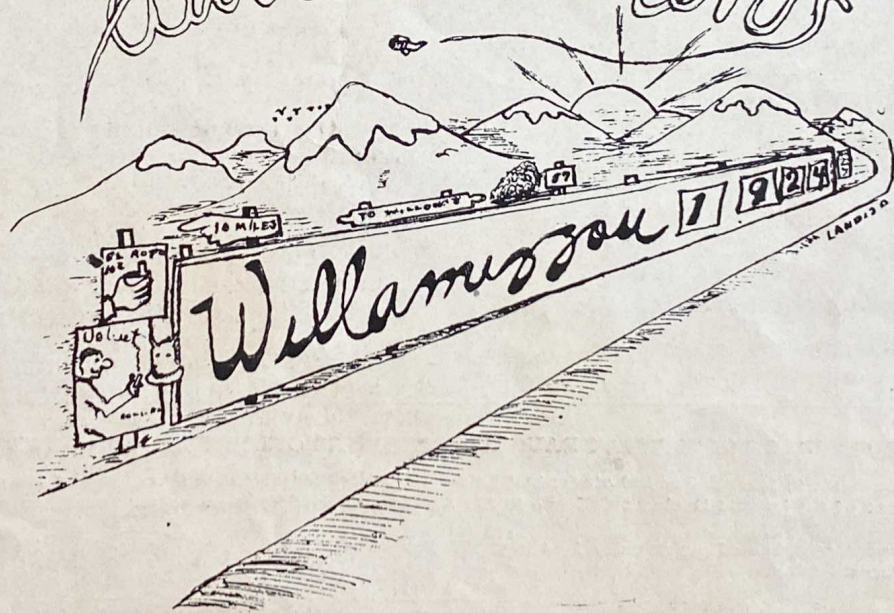
