



YOU'LL LIKE WHAT YOU SEE IN '63 in Willow Springs. At least, if you like hemlines two inches above the knee, ''teased'' hair burgeoning buoyantly about fair faces, caked eye shadow on the lasses, tiny hats, flashy sweaters, and tapered pants on the lads.

President Kennedy urged physical fitness; someone resurrected a Theodore Roosevelt manifesto that Marine officers must be able to walk fifty miles in three days-and America was off in a walking craze in February--which was also over in February. Willow's entries didn't quite make fifty miles in one day; three days would have been too easy to challenge Willow's Weary Willies.

Scott Carpenter orbited the earth; John Glenn celebrated the anniversary of America's first global orbit; Telstar gossiped about the universe, Mariner II passed Venus and reported that fair beauty too hot and dry to move to immediately.

Khrushchev removed missiles--and some men--from Cuba; De Gaulle vetoed Britain's entry into the Common Market. Russell Corn was elected mayor to round out forty years in public elective office; Willow Springs voted for natural gas.

But, as always, Willow Springs students watched the world unwind on their TV screens, then went back to the serious business of textbooks, tests, sports, contests-and dates.



These are the functions of the fine arts--to enrich the pattern of daily living.










Those qualifying on placement tests given in the spring before they enter high school may take algebra their freshman year if they wish; others take general mathematics.

That's communication at school in Willow Springs in 1963.





A PRIMER LESSON FOR SPORTS FANS:


Pictured are the steps in practicing "T-42." The "T" tells the formation, "four" which back will carry the ball, "two" where the ball carrier will cross the line of scrimmage.


The center snaps the ball to the quarterback on a set count. When the quarterback gets the ball, he starts with a step along the line of scrimmage toward the side of play. When the halfback (No. 4 back) reaches the line of scrimmage, the quarterback hands the ball to him (No. 1).

The halfback runs through the "two" hole breaking off the tackle block (No.2).

The quarterback continues along the line of scrimmage, acting as if he still has the ball and faking a hand off to the fullback (No. 2 back) through the "four" hole. The fullback runs as if he has the ball. (No. 3).

The quarterback continues along the line of scrimmage and fakes a pitch out to the other halfback (No. 3 back) who is running wide on this play. (No. 4).






