FOREWORD . . .





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MUSIC DEPARTMENT

The music department presented several assembly programs during the year and gave a night concert in the spring. The girls' sextet and quartet furnished music for teas, banquets, Red Cross drives and other functions throughout the year. Music between acts of the Junior Plays was furnished by the girls' quartet and brass quartet.

The music department and home economics department worked together in presenting a one-act operetta, "The Nifty Shop."

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

The six-point plan adopted by the English department has been used as the gcal of freshmen and sophomore English classes this year. To increase the students' ability to read understandingly, an even greater amount of oral reading and sight reading has been done in literature than has been the usual practice. Themes have been written with unusual care, emphasizing legible writing, accurate spelling, and correct use of capitals. Careful attention by the pupils to enunciation and pronunciation in our class talks and care in expression when reading, help us to speak clearly. An almost weekly theme has given us constant practice in self-expression.

The English III class is using two

books, a literature book, "The American Scene," and a workbook, "Essentials in English."

Outstanding work was done in themes on "Why Should Buy Stamps and Bonds" and "Why I Should Vote for the Proposed New Missouri Constitution."

We have studied punctuation particularly, and correct verb usage, classification of verb forms, with special emphasis on recognition of clauses. Recognition of clauses is necessary in order to punctuate correctly. We have had a book report every six weeks. We worked on speaking clearly and loudly enough that everyone in the room can understand.

VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE

The officers of the local F. F. A. Chapter are. President, Bob Hinds; Vice-President, Jack Clingan; Secretary, Hugh Pottle; Treasurer, Ted Green; Advisor, T. N. Davis; Watch Dog, Floyd Frommel.

Enrollment for '44-'45 started at fifty-two members and dropped to thirtyeight by the end of the first semester. Initiation was held the third week in September and the district initiation was held November 10 at Mountain Grove, with all members attending. The 1944 Springfield judging contests found Willow Springs placing eigh-

teenth in all contests among the thirty-six school. The best showing was in the Jersey division, where the boys ranked seventh. Forty boys made the trip by car and truck. All boys averaged \$84 profit on the projects for 1944. The average number of projects dropped to 1.7 per member. Members of the Vo. Ag. Class ran the popcorn and soft drinks stand at the basketball games, and the money made from these will be used to finance Vo. Ag. parties and banquets. Two members of this class, Ted Sellens and Bob Hinds, were raised to the degree of State Farmer last summer.

VOCATIONAL HOME ECONOMICS

Vocational home economics courses in our high school aim at cultivating the abilities and skills needed in performa ce of household activities, management, controlling expenditure, and guiding the development of individuals in the family group. In these classes, we deal with buying problems, and proper use and care of the things we buy. We give time to improving our ability to understand and make use of available buying guides and buying practices that influence both the consumer and seller.

In our foods laboratory work, we rate our ability to plan menus to meet daily nutritional needs at different cost levels, our management of time and work, success of the dishes we prepare, condition of our work tables, the quietness and quickness with which we work, independence, attractiveness of our tables, our table service and manners, clean aprons, and our thoroughness in cleaning up the laboratory.

During the year, we have participated in the serving of dinners to the Board of Education and the faculty, a home economics tea, and a style show of garments constructed in our vocational home economics classes. We presented a one-act operetta, "The Nifty Shop", in collaboration with the music department, also.

With special emphasis at the present on home canning, we were very glad to add a new pressure cooker and food mill to our list of equipment this year.

Additions to our library include a set each of Red Cross Home Nursing and First Aid Books; reference books on consumer buying; textiles, including new fabrics and finishes; nutrition; and household physics. We have added new charts helpful in our study of nutrition.

VISUAL EDUCATION

Visual education has played an important part in the curriculum of the Willow Springs High School this year. Movies are taking a place of ever increasing importance in the field of education and for a number of years our school has used motion pictures to present educational information to its students. We have come to recognize the value of the picture over the less graphic written page of the text book. Our school has excellent facilities for showing pictures and movies have been more greatly appreciated this year than ever before. Our pictures have been regularly scheduled every other week. The movies are scheduled to coincide with our studies on various subjects. The vocational agricultural department and the Forest Service, also, have furnished us with many movies this year making our visual educational program complete.

COMMERCE

Commerce has played a very important role in starting several boys and girls toward a successful business career. This department includes four subjects: Shorthand, Typing, Bookkeeping, and Business English. We hope that Secretarial Training can be offered for advanced students next year.

We studied "The Gregg Shorthand Functional Method". Perhaps the most beneficial part of the course was taking dictation and transcribing our notes on the typewriter. No one wants to sign his name to an incorrectly written letter with many errors. Transscription and the Business English Course offered a review in grammar, spelling and punctuation. In Bookkeeping, we recorded business transactions in the different kinds of journals, posted ledgers, made work sheets, balance sheets, profit and loss statements, and adjusting and closing entries. We worked three practice sets which gave us training in the use of many business papers.

Everyone seems to enjoy typing. We first learned the situation of keys, but soon we were typing letters, centering poems, setting up tabulation exercises, and typing rough drafts. Punctuation, syllabication, and other English principles received a share of our attention. Accuracy with speed is our goal.

SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

Every day in newspapers and magazines of our country there are many stories about science. These stories tell of discoveries that scientists are making, some of which are so important that they may change the lives of millions of people. In order to understand these stories, we must know the meanings of science words and have accurate science ideas. In working out experiments, exercises, and problems in the science classes we have the opportunities to do the cleancut, careful thinking a scientist does when he makes discoveries about the world. In general science we study the beginnings of the fields of science, physiology, geology, chemistry, physics, and biology. People who are interested in studying these different fields get their start in this course.

SOCIAL STUDIES

Geography, world history, and Amer ican history were taught by Mrs. Munford, who reports unusually good grades from all classes. All classes studied current topics, using the Weekly News Review as their text and stressing current happenings, people and places in the news.

The geography class studied economic geography for the entire world. This is the study of world trade what each country has to sell and what it buys.

World History is the study of the progress of western civilization in Egypt and the Tigris-Euphrates River Valley, to Greece, Staly and Western Europe. This covered the period from 2000 B. C. to the present.

In American history the class began with the study of European background which led to the discovery, exploration, and colonization of America-This led to the study of the Westward expansion which took in the Louisiana Purchase, Florida, the Mexican Cession, and Oregon. A feeling of nationalism and a feeling of sectionalism have always been two rival tendencies in the United States. This rivalry was climaxed by the Civil War. Another important part of American history was the industrial, agricultural and political development which began after the Civil War.

The freshmen citizenship classes were taught by Mrs. Dunivin this year. Since 1944 was election year the most interesting part of our citizenship work was in connection with government. We used that phase first, beginning in the middle of the book in September. We finished by conducting an election in November in which all high school stude ts voted. We hoped to teach students what a free election meant and how voting should be done.

Another interesting phase of our work has been done in connection with our Junior Review papers. These have given us a world view point and kept us well up-to-date on our various political and economic conditons, as well as the war fronts.

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
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
