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


Mr. Bennett came to Willow from the University of Missouri in 1957 bringing his newly acquired degrees of Bachelor of Science in Education and Master of Education with him.

Sports-minded Miss Tandy enjoys water skiing, bowling, and playing softball. She also reads widely and appreciates good music.


Art students keenly missed the inspiring leadership of Mrs. Marie Booth after her heart attack in early December and welcomed her return in March.







Entering as alternates in mechanics, Kary Kilpatric and Brenda Burns both rated I; Brenda's score was only one point lower than Paul's.


Annette Tetrick tied her classmate, James Thomas, for a I rating. Both are freshmen. Cindy Williamson earned a II in spelling.

FFA Wins at Fair


Willow's Future Farmers of America brought home 47 ribbons from the Heart of the Ozarks Howell County Fair August 31-September 2.




Mathematics: Key to Our Standard of Living




Although Missouri requires only general mathematics for graduation, students have five possible units.

Each year, all eighth graders who will enter WSHS in the fall are given the Iowa Algebra Aptitude Test. Those ranking high on the test, which is part of the Missouri State-Wide Testing Program, are advised to take algebra; others take general mathematics. As sophomores, algebra students enroll in plane geometry; in their junior year, advanced algebra; in the senior year, trigonometry and mathematical analysis.

Miss Hoover teaches general mathematics, Mr. Pamperien, the advanced classes.

Communications: Universal Key to All Education

Essential to Americans as individuals in home and business, essential to the United States as a nation, is the ability to communicate by clear, concise speech, understanding reading, careful listening.

But, in the space age, Americans have learned that a command of English is not enough, so Willow students have the opportunity to study French, the second mostused language.

In less interesting moments, students study grammar, spelling, and vocabulary; then they struggle to apply what they have learned in writing themes, school news - or copy, cutlines, and heads for the WILLAMIZZOU.

All Missouri high school graduates must have English I, II, and III taught by Mrs. Smith, Miss Tandy, Miss Hoover, and Mrs. Munford. They may elect English IV and publications with Mrs. Munford.

Space Age Demands Training in Social Studies

In a world where science has made possible the destruction of the world, the people of the world must learn to live together in peace - or face destruction of all the wisdom, the music, the art, which mankind has accumulated. In such a world, social studies become increasingly important.

The state requires three units for graduation citizenship, world history, and American history, taught by Mr. Harmon, Mr. McMurtrey, and Mrs. Dunivin.

Electives are geography, taught by Mr. Thomas, Missouri history and sociology (a half unit of each), and contemporary issues taught by Mrs. Dunivin.

Almost all seniors take contemporary issues to help them pass the tests over the state and the federal constitutions which Missouri law requires for graduation.

Dramatics Stimulates Observation, Understanding

Struggling to create a characterization, the dramatics student becomes a student of human nature. Every person he meets is material for study for dramatic or humorous interpretation, duet acting, or play.

Boys Study and Practice Improved Farming

America's underlying strength of tomorrow will be today's vocational agriculture students. The skills which they acquire in class will contribute to the health, nourishment, and housing of the families of the future.


Vocational Agriculture I boys study fundamentals of beef, dairy, poultry, swine, and sheep production. They also learn to keep accurate farm records and the basic skills of farm mechanics.

Vocational Agriculture II stresses the study of small grains, soil, family food supply, and advanced animal husbandry. Shop work centers on metal work - forging, tempering, soldering, and electric welding. Shop work in Vocational Agriculture III extends to electric arc welding, pipe work and plumbing, concrete construction, farm machinery operation and repair. Classroom work centers on feeds and feeding, pastures, legumes, animal breeding, and livestock diseases.

Seniors concentrate on farm management, farm power, landscaping, home improvement, and soils with the boys serving as apprentices.

All students contract at the beginning of the school year to complete a project, or projects, of their choice which will give actual experience in some phase of farming.
